## Update from the Committee - Keeping you Informed

- The Notice board outside the Hall is looking rather worn and shabby and the committee is very aware that it doesn't give a good impression to those passing by. We have contacted the Parish Council to ask if they are able to replace it with a new one and hope to hear from them soon. If they are unable to help the existing Board will be removed.
- A resident has brought to our attention the state of the Bridleway sign on the corner of Lower Road and Moorhouse Lane. The pole is rotten in places and cannot be repaired. We have contacted Bucks CC who have agreed to replace it as soon as possible.
- Concerns have been raised about the level of darkness during the evenings around the Hall and garden area. After discussion the committee has agreed to use the recent donation from GlaxoSmithKline to install an uplighter in the Community garden to softly illuminate the trees, shrubs and bus shelter from dusk to dawn. This will hugely improve the overall appearance of the area whilst making it feel safer for users of the Hall and Social Club in the dark, winter evenings. Any monies left over from the donation will be used to purchase plants for the gardens.
- The new raised flower beds at the front of the Hall are due to be started imminently - in fact by the time you read this the work might already be underway! When they are finished the beds will be handed over to the Gardening Club to design the planting scheme and we can all look forward to an abundance of colour as they become established.
- At a recent meeting a resident couple attended the Open Session to suggest installing a full size goal post on the field for the younger residents to enjoy. The committee agreed this was a good idea and we were delighted to receive a very generous donation to cover the cost, with a request that any surplus be used to provide seating in the bus shelter. We will be adding these new facilities to the field and shelter in the New Year.

### Gardening Waste - Discount for early birds!

A new chargeable garden waste service will be available to everyone and will start the fortnight commencing 31st March 2014. Collections will take place on the same day as recycling.

The following will be collected from your green bin:

- Leaves and grass cuttings
- Dead plants
- Trimmings and prunings
- Small branches
- Weeds, shrubs and flowers



Please note that for this new service food waste cannot be mixed with garden waste as currently happens.

**You will only receive the new garden waste service if you pay for it.** A discount will be available if you sign up before **31st January 2014** which will mean you pay the reduced price of £35 for the first year, rather than the normal £45.

If you do not wish to subscribe to the new garden waste collection service South Bucks District Council will collect your unwanted bin before the new service starts.

### Higher Denham Senior Luncheon Club

## Neighbourhood Nature Notes

Unless somebody volunteers to take on the editorial role for the news letter, this might be the last Nature Notes I write, so it's a good job the story this year has a mostly happy ending.

No sooner had the previous Nature Notes gone to print lamenting the absence of bats, than they reappeared in the garden whirling round at dusk catching flying insects. More interestingly resident Di Gordon told me that about 70 pipistrelles, mainly females and babies, had been roosting in the loft of 3 Side Road but had moved on of their own accord, which was useful for the resident, as bats are a protected species and one cannot legally disturb them. Then HDCA past Chairman, Len Smith noticed what he thought to be mouse droppings on his garden table. He was investigating the closed parasol over the table when a bat fell into the table! On opening the parasol, a second bat flew out, and both sped off. I suspect the cold wet spring meant not many insects about, and that accounted for their earlier absence.

Likewise, the garden birds had had a hard time, with little success from early nesting. The wonderful warm autumn, however, has helped the second broods to feed up ready for winter. A fledgling Nuthatch, brought to the bird-table by its parent, is now a daily visitor, preferring sunflower seed to the peanuts his name suggests he would go for. The Nuthatch is a delightful, small woodpecker shaped bird, salmon pink below and morning suit grey above with a bold black eye stripe and a tendency to walk head first down tree trunks, not head first up like woodpeckers and tree creepers.

The Goldfinches that fed on the Niger seed have gone. Like many of our "resident" birds (the ones you see all year in the UK) they have presumably moved south, to be replaced by others arriving from colder climes.

I recently received a copy of the latest water vole survey. These charming rodents were the model for Ratty in the book *Wind in the Willows*, so I'm please to say that we still have them in the rivers that border and run through the garden here, but sadly they seem to have disappeared from up stream. Water voles like river banks that are not too heavily overgrown by trees and more important, that have vegetation in the water along the bank, so if you have a house in Lower Road backing onto the Misbourne, try to leave the wild iris, a favourite food, and other marginal plants along the bank and do not "tidy" the river too much and perhaps they will return.

Lastly, we returned from a sailing trip 2 weeks ago, to find a dead shrew on the front doormat; a "present" from a neighbour's cat I assume. About 5 to 6 cm long with a 3 cm tail, brown-black fur, pale underneath and a long pointed snout, this is one of the smallest and most common of the UK's mammals, but we do not often see live ones because they live in the undergrowth. Active by day and more so at night, they eat their own weight in insects, spiders and worms every day, because such a small body loses heat quickly.

They are solitary and very territorial and will fight any other shrew invading their 400 sq. m. (a small back garden) home patch. They get together only to breed, which they do 4 or 5 times a year producing 6 or more young each time. If the nest is disturbed, the young follow mum in single file each holding the tail of the one ahead with its prehensile snout. With that rate of breeding, the only reason we are not overrun by them is that they are eaten by owls, foxes and other predators. Shrews apparently exude a liquid, from glands in the skin, that cats dislike, which is probably why we got the "present". Still it's a nice sign that they are about.

Clearing the dead plants from an herbaceous border we found, a foot above ground level, what I think was a dormouse nest, but that, and why cats give humans "presents", are stories for next time, providing there's a Newsletter to put them in!
